The Day Wall Street Exploded

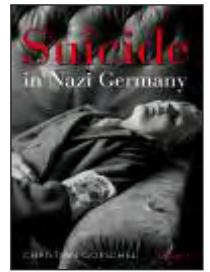
Muslims in America

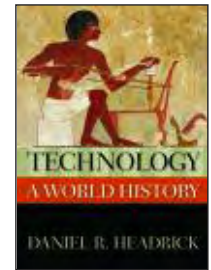
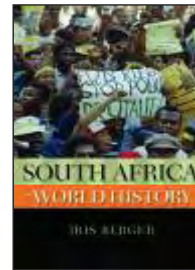
The Balkans in World History

Favela: Four Decades of living on the Edge in Rio de Janeiro

Global urbanization is without question one of the most important social trends of the past thirty years. Yet it has been a highly uneven process, with roughly half of all city dwellers in the developing world living in slums and about 1 billion of them are squatters, living informally in makeshift housing. Perlman's first book, *The Myth of Marginality* (1976), was the first in-depth account of life in the favelas, she argued that poor favela residents were not marginal, but functioning members of Brazilian society and important contributors to social stability. This book carries that story forward to the present, and the result is truly groundbreaking: the first longitudinal ethnographic study of the global urban poor, the fastest growing population in the world.
