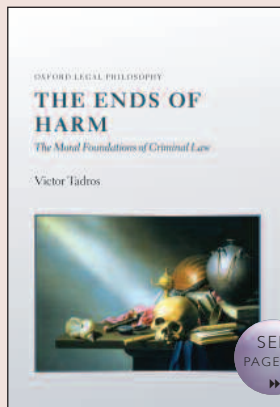
Groundbreaking Scholarship

Essential Reference

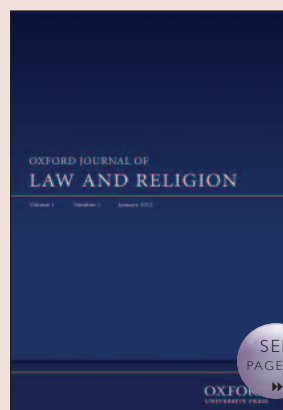
