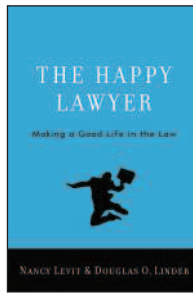

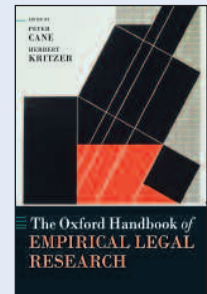

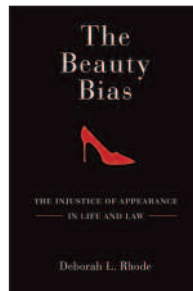

The evidence is inarguable: people who are conventionally more attractive do better in the workplace both in terms of hiring and promotion. Moreover, there is a vast and highly profitable industry behind America's obsession with physical appearance that reinforces these trends. And as Deborah Rhode shows in *The Beauty Bias*, women bear a vastly disproportionate share of the burden. The cultural prejudice has real costs for millions of people, yet appearance bias laws exist in only a handful of states and localities, and even these laws are only loosely enforced. Just as importantly, the beauty industry is gigantic, and its logic generally goes unquestioned in the marketplace. It effectively works to reinforce these prejudices, and Rhode, one of America's leading scholars on social justice and discrimination, explains how it works alongside a legal system that does not do enough to address the problem.
