He is the author of *Causatives and Causation: A Universal-Typological Perspective* (1996), *Linguistic Typology: Morphology and Syntax* (2001), and *The Korean Language: Structure, Use and Context* (2005), and also the editor of *Case, Typology and Grammar* (with Anna Siewierska, 1998), and *Frontiers of Korean Language Acquisition* (2006). He has held visiting appointments with Max Planck Institute for Evolutionary Anthropology (Leipzig), and La Trobe University (Melbourne).
