**Antoin E. Murphy**

Antoin E. Murphy is an associate professor of economics and fellow of Trinity College, University of Dublin where he has been teaching since 1968. His special interests are in macroeconomics, monetary economics and the history of economic thought. He is one of the joint managing editors of the *European Journal of the History of Economic Thought*. In 2002, resulting from his discovery of Nicholas Du Tot's manuscript and his editorial work on this manuscript resulting in the publication of *Du Tot Histoire du Système de John Law*, he was awarded the Blanqui prize for the best book on the history of economic thought by the European Society for the History of Economic Thought. His book on Richard Cantillon, published by Oxford University Press in 1986, has been translated into French and his book on John Law, again published by Oxford University Press in 1997, has been translated into both French and German. He has been involved in many public debates involving economic issues in Ireland.

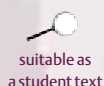
Rather than emphasising the decline of the British economy, this book stresses modernity and the growth of new patterns of consumption in areas such as the service sector and the leisure industry.

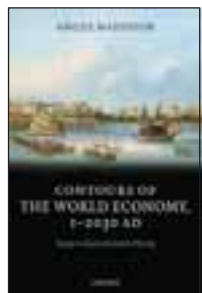

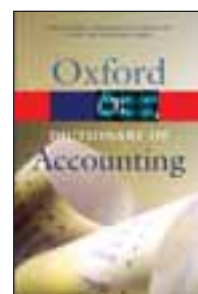
