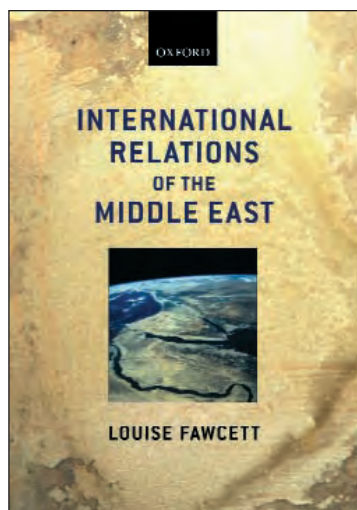

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In this book, leading scholars of the Middle East and International Relations present a balanced and comprehensive analysis of the international politics of the region. While offering an historical framework, and up-to-date analysis of contemporary events, the book also introduces key theories and concepts from the study of International Relations, and applies them to a Middle Eastern context to help explain major currents and developments. The first section offers an historical and chronological overview of the principal developments in the international politics of the Middle East within the broader context of an evolving international system. The second section considers region specific conflicts and issues - the Arab-Israel crisis, wars in the Gulf, US and European policy - and examines them from an international relations perspective. The third and final section looks at major themes in International Relations - globalization, democratization, cooperation and conflict - and applies them to the Middle East, offering a regionally-sensitive perspective.

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FROM THE AUTHOR

"The International Relations of the Middle East is a book I have always wanted to put together. There has long been a real gap between area studies and international relations, and the Middle East is perhaps exceptional in this regard. The region, for some good reasons, has stubbornly resisted those theoretical paradigms and models beloved by social scientists.

Certainly, in an era where interdisciplinary studies are on the rise, some progress has been made, but much remains to be done, I was encouraged by the number of people who thought, like me, that this was a book waiting to be written. Obviously, events in the Middle East itself in the past two years make its publication even more timely.

A single author book can do many things, and already some leading scholars have brought their expertise to different aspects of this topic. But the beauty of an edited volume, like this one, is that it combines a variety of skills and approaches, offering students a real menu for choice. I have been lucky to secure the participation of experts from both Middle East Studies and International Relations, which means that the volume offers a rich range of perspectives for explaining and understanding the international politics of the region. My experience of teaching suggests that students want to consult works that are short and accessible, but at the same time analytical and informative, and need the different chapters of the book to aim to supply this need. Some cover background and history; others deal with major themes like globalization, democratization and war; and others offer in-depth analysis of current issues like the Arab-Israel and Gulf conflicts. The style is deliberately modern and user-friendly. My hope is that the book will reach out to a wide student audience in a diverse range of disciplines."

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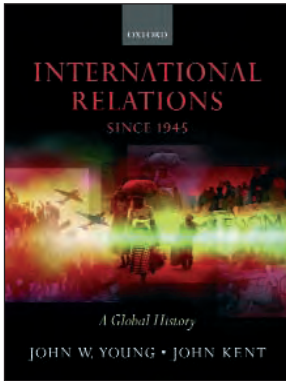

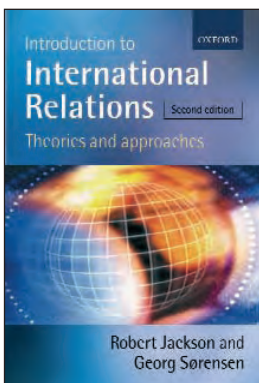
International Relations since 1945 is a one-volume authoritative historical analysis of international relations during the Cold War and its aftermath. It describes and interprets events since 1945 for an undergraduate audience. It not only explores how the Cold War impacted upon world politics as a whole, but also deals with such important regional problems as the Middle East, the development of European integration and the end of the European empires in Africa and Asia. While focusing on political change, careful attention is paid to the evolution of the global economy and the interplay between international and domestic developments, as well as to the growth of 'interdependence'. Particular attention is paid to the role of the United States, especially in the 1990s when it became the world's only superpower. The text covers the nature of the Cold War, the development of the Western and Eastern blocs, North-South, decolonization and Third World issues, international economic relations, armaments and nuclear strategy and globalisation.
