Important information about the migration of Oxford Law Online services

On July 24th 2013, Oxford University Press (OUP) is migrating the *Max Planck Encyclopedia of Public International Law*, *Oxford Reports on International Law* and *Investment Claims* to a new platform, offering a fresh and modern look and feel, enhanced functionality, and greater discoverability.

I am writing to give you further details about the migration, providing information on important maintenance tasks that need to be carried out in order that your users can continue to access the services on the new sites, including:

1. Access methods
2. Updating links and bookmarks
3. Usage statistics
4. Browser compatibility

This information follows on the next pages, please make sure you familiarize yourself with the areas that will impact you and your users. Please note this information is the same for each one of the three migrating services.



IP Authentication	Users will continue to be able to access the sites via IP address authentication. If users have bookmarks set up linking to specific content, all URLs will re-direct to the site homepages.

Username and Password	You can continue accessing via username and password by visiting the sites and entering your details, or when prompted to do so from non-authenticated pages within the site.

2. Updating links and bookmarks

URLs will change to:

- www.oxfordlawreports.com will change to <http://opil.ouplaw.com/home/ORIL>
- www.mpepil.com will change to <http://opil.ouplaw.com/home/EPIL>
- www.investmentclaims.com will change to <http://oxia.ouplaw.com/home/IC>

We are unable to provide a direct mapping of entry level and public page content from the old sites to the new, so the user will need to update bookmarks manually by visiting the new sites and locating the new pages. We advise that people update their bookmarks as soon as they can after the launch.

Public Pages: all public “information” pages on the old sites will be improved and transferred to the new sites; thereafter users will not be able to access public pages on the old sites.

3. Usage Statistics

COUNTER statistics will continue to be produced; however you may notice some changes to how these are displayed following the migration. Please contact oxfordonline@oup.com should you have any questions regarding your COUNTER statistics.

4. Browser compatibility

All current standard web browsers will be supported. These include:

- Internet Explorer for Windows (version 8 and higher)
- Firefox Mac and Windows (versions 8 and higher)
- Safari Mac and Windows (versions 5 and higher)
- Google Chrome Mac and Windows (versions 17 and higher)
