1966 Frank Robinson of the Baltimore Orioles become the first and only (as of 2006) black to win baseball's Triple Crown, leading the league in hitting average, home runs, and runs batted in (RBIs). He is unanimously voted the American League Most Valuable Player. He is the second African American in the Major League to win the award and the first to be elected by his peers.
